Subject: **FCMPP Meeting Scheduled for December 12 in Waterville**

Our next Friends Committee on Maine Public Policy meeting will take place at the Alford Youth Center in Waterville on Saturday December 12 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. (Directions below.) Bring bag lunch.

We are very fortunate to have as our morning speaker Andy Burt, who will be sharing information on Maine Indians' work on environmental issues. We may be joined by a tribal member that day, but that has not been confirmed. Andy is a member of Midcoast Meeting who has worked with the Maine Council of Churches on global-warming and food-security issues. This fall, Andy met with community and tribal members in Washington and Aroostook counties to discuss local environmental initiatives.

Afternoon FCMPP business session. Among the items we will consider:

1. Continuing our discussion about a possible FCMPP environmental focus relating to our two major priorities: criminal justice and Maine Indians.
2. The FCMPP Legislative Committee and process for handling legislative issues in the next session of the Maine legislature.
3. How to strengthen or deepen the involvement of Meetings and individuals in the committee's actions and activities aside from or in addition to attending the full Committee meetings.

Directions to Alford Youth Center: From I-95 to Waterville, Exit 34, south on Main Street, at 2nd intersection light turn right onto Eustis Parkway until it T's into North Street, turn left on North Street. After several hundred yards of playing fields on the right, turn right into the parking lot for Alford Youth Center, the new building on right. Check at main desk to find meeting room.

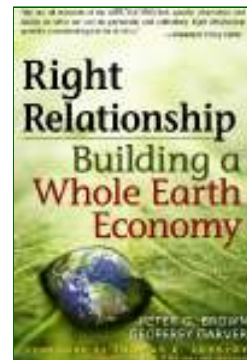
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### ***ADVICES***

**Peace & Reconciliation--** Every human being is a child of God with a measure of God's Light. War and other instruments of violence and oppression ignore this reality and violate our relation with God. Let us keep primary, therefore, Friends' concern for removing the causes of war. Let us seek, through God's power and grace, to overcome in our own hearts the emotions that lie at the root of violence. At every opportunity, let us be peacemakers in our homes, in our communities, and in our places of work. Let us take care that we who declare against war do not nourish the seeds of war in our possessions. Friends are urged to support those who witness to their governments and take personal risks in the cause of peace, who choose not to participate in war as soldiers nor to contribute to its preparations with their taxes. Let us support in all possible ways the development of international order, justice, and understanding.

We invite you to join us in an exploration of the concept of right relationship and its impact on each of us and the Meeting, starting in January, one Sunday a month (date to be announced). This study group will be based on the book *Right Relationship: Building a Whole Earth Economy* by Peter G. Brown and Geoffrey Garver. We invite you to read the introduction and chapter 1. You are welcome to join us, even if you have not read the book.

The authors of *Right Relationship* define the Quaker principle of right relationship as "respecting the integrity, reliance, and beauty of human and natural communities." They also refer to "human and natural communities" as the "commonwealth of life." They maintain that orienting ourselves toward living with the principle of right relationship as our guideline and goal is essential in building a healthy ecology and economy.



Watch for our coming announcement in the January newsletter. Two queries to consider on this topic are: What is wealth? What increases well-being? [Ed. note: you can see short articles on this book in both the September and October issues of the newsletter.]

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### From the Working Parties on Racism, Framingham Friends Meeting and NEYM.

**Portraits of African American Leaders:** This special exhibit, on loan from the Smithsonian Institute to the Museum of African American History, features images of 69 leaders over 150 years. The theme "Let Your Motto Be Resistance [to Enslavement]" is a quotation from Henry Highland Garnet, abolitionist, editor, and clergyman in the 1840s. It will remain at the museum at 46 Joy Street on Beacon Hill, Boston, until January 10. Free admission.

**Gift Books.** Two beautifully illustrated books for young Friends (11 and up?) come highly recommended. *Let's Talk About Race* by Julius Lester with artist Karen Barbour encourages the readers to tell and hear stories about others instead of looking at their outer appearance. Lester, a resident of western Massachusetts, is a long-time civil-rights activist and musician. *Muhammad*, written and illustrated by Demi, author of other children's books like *Gandhi* and *Buddha*, tells of the Prophet Muhammad's life, emphasizing that the Prophet's message was the same as given to the Old Testament prophets and Jesus. ## DISCERNING JOBS ESSENTIAL TO THE MEETING

*On October 28, Gifts & Leadings facilitated a meeting with Midcoast Friends entitled "Discerning Jobs Essential to the Meeting." This followed up the worship sharing on September 20, "'How Can We Keep Our Meeting Vital?'"*

*The goal of the meeting was to evaluate if and how the work that needs to be accomplished is getting the required attention and how we can be open to new or alternative ways of accomplishing tasks and conducting outreach while forging a strong sense of community. Participation in the earlier discussion was high. In evaluating the earlier meeting, the Gifts & Leading Committee drew on the comments and thoughts of members and formulated recommendations that could be presented to the full membership at Monthly Meeting.*

*Committee members felt that the process of discerning what might make the Meeting more vital and active is one that will take some time, since it requires that we talk with each other and work together to accomplish any changes. The committee estimates that it will take nine months to implement the following recommendations. Gifts & Leadings agreed to meet four times a year with special called meetings, if necessary.*

*The following are the recommendations for Monthly Meeting that will be considered at Business Meeting on Sunday, December 20.*

1. Based on feedback and comments from members, we recommend that twice a year Meeting members gather to discuss the health of the meeting and that members work together to be open to new ideas, suggestions, and thoughts.
2. Currently, the standard procedure is for all committees of the Meeting to report every month. Based on a recommendation by a Meeting member and endorsed by other members, Gifts & Leadings recommends that one committee be featured each Business Meeting, so members can concentrate more on thinking about the direction and needs of each committee.

The Gifts & Leadings Committee also recognizes that some areas of members' concerns transcend and overlap with the committee structure. Therefore, the committee also recommends, on months when a committee is not featured, that the topic of outreach, spiritual development and education, or service also be included on the Monthly Meeting Business Agenda as a separate agenda item for wider discussion and contemplation. We hope that the emphasis of these discussions will be on talking and working together. At Business Meeting, the committees that are not featured but have issues to discuss may, as always, ask to be placed on the agenda.

3. Recognizing that there has been a Meeting Handbook in years past and that a current one is not now available, the Gifts & Leadings Committee recommends that, along with updating the Meeting Handbook, we update job descriptions for the committees, for the clerk of the Meeting, the recording clerk, and the treasurer. To ensure timely completion of these job descriptions, it was suggested that each committee be asked to present their job descriptions at the first Business Meeting at which they would be featured. The clerk will send copies of the old handbook committee description to all committees. The job description will make it easier for attendees, new people, and current members to get involved in the work of the Meeting and be a guide for the committees.
4. With attendees and newcomers, we would like to recommend that a process be developed for asking people what they are interested in knowing about the Meeting and that this include designating several members to follow up to make sure that people are getting the information or help they need. The Gifts & Leadings Committee recommends that the emphasis be on identifying the types of things that would make it easier for members and attenders to be involved in the meeting.
5. The Gifts & Leadings Committee recognizes that many, many members of the Meeting are involved in service to their neighbors and in the wider world. The act of providing service is of high value for Friends. The Gifts & Leadings Committee recommends that time be dedicated for members to meet and talk about service that we might also perform as a community.

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6. Gifts and Leadings, upon the recommendations and advice of members, recommends that Ministry & Counsel focus its work and discussions on supporting and nurturing silent and vocal ministry within our meeting. There was the sense that Pastoral Care is doing a very good job of caring for members.
7. As a result of conversations with members, Gifts & Leadings also recommends that a new category be created of "Resource People," which will include people who are willing to do special jobs when asked.



**The New Year's Candle-**

**Lighting** will take place during Meeting for Worship on January 3. While it is not required, those who wish to do so may bring a candle to light (in a holder, please). The vocal ministry during this Light celebration is often about reflections on the past year and hopes for the new one.
